Disc golf course about to become a reality

Looking for a family-friendly and inexpensive outdoor sport that you can enjoy nearly year-round in Nantucket? Consider disc golf, a sport for all ages and all skill levels. The only investment in equipment is approximately \$10 for a disc (Frisbee).

Nantucket Disc Golf, a 501(c)(3) organization, has worked in collaboration with the Massachusetts Department of Conservation and Recreation since 2008 on the development of a disc golf course in the Nantucket State Forest (see accompanying map). John Varkonda, the State Forest Superintendent for Martha's Vineyard and


Nantucket, will oversee the course. It is anticipated that preliminary site work will begin soon, continue through October and resume early next spring.

Spokesperson Todd Rainwater, one of the principals in developing the course, said that NDG's number one need right now is finding volunteers to help build the course. To

While NDG has raised the funds to begin installation, it is now turning to the community for financial support. One way in which community members can contribute is to participate in the "Sponsor a Basket" program. A donation of \$300 entitles the donor to naming rights on the basket.

Disc golf enjoys a growing popularity, with more than 2,500 courses nationwide. According to the course directory on www.pdga.com, the Web site of the Professional Disc Golf Association, there is an 18-hole disc golf course at Burgess Park in Marstons Mills and a 27-hole course at Riverhead Field in Oak Bluffs.
